

The Giant Trees and Beautiful Valley


Long ago, not many people lived in California. The first people to live there were loggers. The loggers cut down the trees to sell the wood.



Life in Antarctica

Antarctica is cold! There is thick ice all over. It is the coldest place on Earth. It is actually a <u>desert</u> because it barely rains or snows.

<u>The Antarctic Treaty</u> was a deal agreed on by 12 countries. This means only scientists can live there. A regular person cannot move there.

There is not much life in Antarctica. Most of the life is tiny and <u>microscopic</u>, like bacteria. This means you need a microscope to see it! Penguins and seals live in the water and on land. Whales swim in the water. Some birds visit each year. Not many plants grow because it is so cold and <u>harsh</u>. Life does not do well here.

Scientists study in Antarctica. Some scientists study how ice and water work. Others study how life <u>adapts</u> and is able to live in the cold. It is a hard place for life but a great place for science.


Antarctica is the coldest place on Earth. It is always freezing. Yet penguins and some humans are able to live there. How do they do it?






The Water Cycle

Do you know where rain comes from? It is water from the sky! How does the water get there? The answer is the sun. The sun heats up the ocean and rivers and lakes. Then the water on top turns into <u>vapor</u>. Vapor is mini drops of water that can float in the air. The vapor then rises up into the sky.

When the water vapor gets cold, it turns into clouds. The wind blows the clouds in the sky. When the clouds get too full, the water falls back to earth. This is rain.

Rain mostly goes into the ground. But the ground can only hold a little water at a time. When there is too much rain for the ground, the water goes back to the ocean. This makes streams and rivers. This water goes back to the ocean. Then the water cycle starts again!





Steps



- I. The sun heats up the ocean.
- 2. Ocean water evaporates and rises into the air.
- 3. The water vapor cools and condenses to become droplets, which form clouds.
- If enough water condenses, the drops become heavy enough to fall to the ground as rain and snow.
- 5. Some water collects in the ground. The rest flows through rivers back into the ocean.



Why are people scared of bats? One reason is that people are scared of things they do not know about. Another reason is because bats come out at night. Some people are more scared at night. But are bats scary?


Bats must look for food at night. This is because the sun dries out their wings during the day. To find food in the dark, bats "see"


with their ears. First, they make a sound. Then, they wait for the sound to come back. This can tell how far away something is.
